This year's Founders Day Committee co-chaired by Mary Herkner, John Billingsley and Ruth Ann Nagle,



provided the able leadership for the months of necessary preparations by the various committees and volunteers. The Sites Committee led by Charles Dinsmore orchestrated the meticulous preparations of the museum's buildings and grounds. Everything was ready, painted, polished and in its place to welcome visitors this past September 9th and 10th.

### **Local Newspaper Correspondents**

To a history buff like me the local newspaper correspondents of their era are my heroes. They are the ones that put to paper the events of the time and made sure it got in the local paper.

Sometimes their reporting was as mundane as who visited who that week or that a dog was loose in town. Maybe it was a full-length feature about a local topic or individual.

The Sanford area has had locally based newspaper correspondents reporting as far back as the 1880s. In the early days the correspondents did not sign their real name to the column in the Midland paper (Sanford did not have a paper) but rather a catchy nickname. You could read reports by Mossback and Brick in the 1880s.

In the late 1800s and early 1900s Mrs. L. J. Utter was the local correspondent for the *Midland Republican*. After her death in 1911 you see a void in local news in the paper for a time.

You see Mrs. Ross Archer (1947), Mrs. Ann Weir (1948) and Mrs. Carl Randall (1950) contributing as

local correspondents to the paper. Also in the 1950s you see Mrs. Mitchell reporting on Sanford area events and Mrs. Hazen Briggs filing reports about the Averill area. They all listed their home phone numbers in the paper in case you wanted to give them a call with the latest "scoop".

Mrs. Joseph Maynard (Betty) begins her reporting in the late 1950s and is going strong into the 1970s. Betty wrote some wonderful feature stories for the *Midland Daily News* newspaper as well as covering local news, including news from the Meridian Public Schools. Betty also found time (along with Ruth Dancer) to coauthor the Sanford Area Centennial Souvenir Program in 1970.

Bill and June Murray established the *Area News & Views* newspaper in Sanford in 1961 and provided local

news. The Murray's sold their newspaper to the Key family of Coleman and then the local Sanford news was found inside the *Coleman Tribune* with Sanford resident Mrs. Doris (Ginger) Seelhoff serving as the local correspondent (circa 1962 – 1964).

Beginning in 1969 with the birth of the *Sanford Express* newspaper, Don Marquardt and his correspondents (like Betty Davis) contributed numerous stories which today help paint the historical picture of the Sanford area.

Any way you look at it we owe a debt of gratitude to these individuals who over the years bird-dogged the stories, wrote them down, and made sure they got in the paper. It's because of their efforts that we today can read about the history of our area.
